THE ROYAL AIR FORCE SQUADRONAIRES is one of the United Kingdom's finest big bands and has a worldwide reputation for musical excellence. The origins of the Squadronaires can be traced back to 1939 when many of London's professional musicians were recruited into the Central Band of the Royal Air Force. Amongst these iconic musicians were trombonist George Chisolm, vocalist Jimmy Miller and clarinetist Harry Lewis who later married Forces' Sweetheart, Dame Vera Lynn.

In their early years, the RAF Squadronaires gained a reputation for versatility and flair and soon developed a distinctive style that rivalled many American bands. The unmistakable sound of the RAF Squadronaires is still heard through frequent performances of their signature tunes, "There's Something in the Air" and "South Rampart Street Parade," which were made famous by the original group. In 2010, the Squadronaires reached the top ten in the UK's album chart with "In the Mood," recorded for Decca 69 years after first working with the esteemed record label. The Squadronaires continue to be the only military ensemble to have performed at the world famous Ronnie Scott's Jazz Club in London as well as making regular television appearances at events such as the Royal British Legion's annual Festival of Remembrance.



In 2014, the Band released the album "All Present and Correct" which features solos by every member of the group. More recently, they collaborated with Decca to feature on the "Vera Lynn 100" album, accompanying the original recording of Dame Vera's voice on the timeless song "Yours." Dame Vera Lynn's 100th birthday celebrations also featured the RAF Squadronaires as the stage band for a tribute concert at the London Palladium where a plethora of stars from stage and screen joined them to pay homage to the great artist.

Alongside performances at jazz festivals and fundraising concerts, the Squadronaires provide musical support at Military Tattoos around the world as well as State Events and Garden Parties at Buckingham Palace.



THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE BAND began in 1941 when the newly-formed U.S. Army Air Corps activated 59 bands into operation. It was initially called The Bolling Field "Band" and consisted of five men—a saxophone quartet and a bandleader. Over the next 76 years, the Band has expanded its size and mission to include six primary performing ensembles and a global mission. The U.S. Air Force Band consists of six separate performing ensembles: Air Force Strings, Airmen of Note, Ceremonial Brass, Concert Band, Max Impact and Singing Sergeants. Each group supports several small ensembles as well. Collectively, these groups perform more than 1,600 events annually. The Band's Airmen musicians also entertain service members deployed overseas and present concerts coast-to-coast through local performances and national concert tours.

Through world-class musical presentations and ceremonies, The U.S. Air Force Band helps create bonds between the United States and the worldwide community. Using music to bridge language, cultural, societal and socio-economic differences, the Band's performances honor those who have served, inspire American citizens to heightened patriotism and service, and advance international relationships for positive and long-lasting impressions of the U.S. Air Force and the United States of America. The excellence demonstrated by our Airmen musicians is a reflection of the excellence carried out 24 hours a day by Airmen stationed around the globe. These professionals are proud to represent all Airmen, whose selfless service and sacrifices ensure the freedoms we enjoy as American citizens.



The AIRMEN OF NOTE is the premier jazz ensemble of the United States Air Force. Created in 1950 to continue the tradition of Major Glenn Miller's Army Air Corps dance band, the current band consists of 18 active duty Airmen musicians including one vocalist. Through the years, the Airmen of Note has presented its own brand of big band jazz as well as more contemporary forms of jazz to audiences via annual tours across the United States, deployments around the world and local performances throughout metropolitan Washington, D.C. Each year, their Jazz Heritage Series is broadcast to millions over National Public Radio, independent jazz radio stations, satellite radio services and the internet. In addition, the "Note" produces and delivers recorded music to millions of fans worldwide each year. The "Note's" most recent recording, "Veteran's of Jazz," opened in the top 50 jazz CDs broadcast through radio stations nationwide.
